Absent Friends

Frank Mouritz



Frank Mouritz passed away last December and has left a long and interesting legacy. He was surrounded by family at Busselton's Capecare.

Frank was born in Gnowangerup and grew up in Katanning and Perth.

Aged 18 Frank was enlisted into the Royal Australian Air Force where he trained in WA before coming to

England and flying for the Royal Air Force. As a Lancaster pilot, Frank flew in Mickey the Moocher for 34 missions with 61 Squadron.



Wing Commander Jim Wright DFC



Jim Wright passed away on 2nd of June at John Radcliffe Hospital in Oxford.

Jim volunteered for flying duties in 1941 and trained as navigator. Following his flying training in Canada he joined Ken Ames and his crew, completing his first tour with 61 Squadron at RAF Syerston.

He then joined 630 squadron at RAF East Kirkby, completing his second tour with that squadron.

This was followed by a third tour with 97 (Pathfinder) Squadron at RAF Coningsby.

After the war Jim worked tirelessly to influence the MOD to create a Bomber Command Campaign Medal. Making several appeals to the media and the government, at one stage visited the Prime Minister at Downing Street. Sadly, he was unable to achieve that aim before he had to give up the quest because of ill health.

His funeral was held on the 1st of August.



Memorial weekend

Unlike previous years the weekend started with a meet and greet on the Saturday evening to welcome those who had travelled for the weekend.

This was held in the Skellingthorpe Community centre, and we welcomed families from many of the veterans who flew with one of the two squadrons. This included Sue McRae and family and Vicky Lyndsey, both had laid a memorial stone at the International Bomber Command Centre to honour their relatives in the afternoon.

Sue is the daughter of Ted McRae and Vicky Lyndsey is the niece of Ian Loveridge who was killed in the crash in which Ted survived.

Other relatives there on the night were Jon Taylor, Neville Street and Roger Paul.

Earlier in the day we had our AGM in which it was decided that we would no longer hold an event on the Saturday evening. However, it was stressed that should anyone come up for the Saturday we can always meet in the local hostelry.

The service on the Sunday morning was taken by our Chaplain Kevin Hart and we are grateful to the Lincoln Civic party for attending along with the 204 (City of Lincoln) Air Cadets and various standard bearers, along with relatives and members of Friends of RAF Skellingthorpe.

Thanks, are also made to Tracey from the Lincoln Hospitals band, who stood in at the last moment to play the last Post.

We then proceeded to the Community Centre where lunch was provided by the Parish Council and this was followed by a service at the village memorial, which was taken by the local rector Sam Durren. We were also pleased to see Jill Harris the daughter of Bill Drinkell who was a great supporter of the former squadron's association.

BOMBER COMMAND GATEWAY TRUST

The next phase of this memorial has started, the section shown in the photo opposite is the fuselage. There has been a renewed effort for fundraising. The pandemic unfortunately caused a slowdown, during which time the price of steel tripled in price during that period.

The trust now needs in the region of £180,000.

Although intended to be a reminder of all Bomber Command crews, one such aircraft, Lancaster R5689 (VN-N) crashed on 18th September 1942 as it limped home from a mission over the Baltic Sea and four members of its crew perished. Because that crash site is so close, and the fact that VN-N of 50 Squadron was also the most photographed Lancaster of the war it has been chosen as the basis of this landmark to serve as a permanent reminder of Lincolnshire's link to war-time aviation.

Roy Chadwick 1893 to 1947 by David Willey

The 23rd of August 2022 marks the 75th anniversary of the tragic death of prolific aircraft designer Roy Chadwick CBE, FRSA FRAeS at Woodford in Greater Manchester. Roy Chadwick was born on the 30th April 1893 at Farnsworth, Widnes and at the age of 18 in 1911 he started work as assistant draughtsman at A.V. Roe and Company AVRO based at Brownsfield Mill, Manchester.

Throughout Roy Chadwick's working career Roy designed many aircraft including iconic aircraft such as the Avro Anson, Manchester, Lancaster, Lincoln, Vulcan and Avro Tudor which was an airliner based on Avro Lincoln Parts.



On Friday night the 22nd of August 1947 modifications were carried out overnight on Avro Tudor II G-AGSU which involved disconnecting the ailerons. The idea was to carry out a test flight early on the Saturday morning from Woodford carrying out flight tests over the Lake District.

The crew boarded the AVRO Tudor with Bill Thorn Avro's chief test pilot at the controls. As Bill Thorn went through the cockpit checks and had to rely on a third person to tell him the position of the ailerons as you could not see them from the cockpit. Sadly, despite the checks it was undetected that the ailerons had been cross coupled.

Bill Thorn started his take off run and just getting airborne Bill Thorn tried to correct the port yaw caused by the engines and with the ailerons being incorrectly coupled he tried to correct to Starboard. Bill Thorn realised he had a problem, so he cut engines and the Tudor slid across the field next to the runway. The aircraft then slid into a dew pond surrounded by trees at Shirfold Farm Woodford causing the nose to break off. Roy Chadwick whose usual position was to stand between the pilot's seats was thrown out the cockpit and he suffered a fractured skull that killed him instantly. Sadly, Bill Thorn and his co-pilot David Wilson were drowned. John Webster engineer and wireless operator also lost his life in the crash.

I would like to thank the late Peter Thorn for the insight on his father Sidney Albert (Bill) Thorn in writing this article.



Avro Lincoln RF471 Memorial By David Willey

In the months leading up to the Covid lockdown the Friends of RAF Skellingthorpe were preparing to dedicate a memorial plaque to the crew of a 61 Squadron Avro Lincoln RF471 which crashed near RAF Skellingthorpe on the 15^{th of} July of 1949.

Sadly, with the restrictions imposed we had to postpone the event. During the lockdown we have still been researching the Avro Lincoln crew with the hope of finding some of the crew's family and friends.

I am really thrilled to say we have found Pauline the daughter Navigator II Morris Waterfall and his two granddaughters. Morris who at the time of his death lived in Moorland Avenue, Lincoln.

We were also contacted by Mat Knight nephew of Navigator F/LT Raymond Knight. Mat contacted us via the FRAFS Face book Page. It appears that Mat's uncle Ray had recently married Evelyn and lived in Boultham, Lincoln.


